

Q1: Where do you live?







Q3: When do you typically visit the River Valley Wilderness Park?








Q4: What do you usually do when you visit the River Valley Wilderness Park? (Select all that apply)

Q7: What are your priorities in the River Valley Wilderness Park?

276 responses

Below are the main themes emerging from what residents value and prioritize in the River Valley Wilderness Park:

Preserving the Natural Environment

This was the strongest theme. Many people want the park to remain wild and undeveloped, emphasizing:

- Keeping it natural, quiet, and peaceful
- Protecting wildlife and native plants
- Avoiding too much infrastructure or pavement





Improved Trails & Accessibility

Many users appreciate the park but want it to be easier and safer to use:

- Requests for paved or smoothed trails, especially for strollers, wheelchairs, and bikes
- Better access from town (particularly safer crossing of the bridge or Highway 811)
- Clear signage and maps of trail routes

Cleanliness & Ongoing Maintenance

A lot of responses focused on upkeep, with specific mentions of:

- Garbage collection and litter control
- Weed removal and trail clearing
- Repairing washrooms, benches, and fences



Safety & Comfort



Several comments reflected concerns about:

- Speeding vehicles and motorized users on trails
- General safety for families and solo visitors
- Visibility and patrols to discourage unwanted activity

Peace, Mental Health & Nature Connection

A significant number of comments highlighted:

- Using the park to decompress, reflect, and unwind
- Prioritizing quiet walks, fresh air, and a break from town life
- The value of this space for mental and emotional wellbeing



Family Friendly Amenities

People want to spend more time here as a family, and suggested:

- Better picnic areas, benches, and shelters
- A clean, well-maintained playground
- Space for kids to explore and play

Wildlife & Environmental Education

Several responses tied nature appreciation with learning and awareness:

- Signage, storyboards, or plant ID markers
- Respecting the environment and encouraging others to do the same
- Protecting habitat from disruption

Q6: What would make you visit the River Valley Wilderness Park more often?

271 responses

Trails and Pathways

- Paved pathways/trails: Over 80 comments mentioned a preference for paved paths for accessibility (wheelchairs, strollers, bikes).
- Longer trail system: Many want extended loops or additional trail routes.
- Trail maintenance: Requests for weed control, debris removal, and fixing existing paths.
- Keep trails natural: A small number of comments (under 5) strongly opposed paving, wishing to preserve the natural feel.
- Parking: Paved or expanded parking areas requested.



Access & Connectivity

 Easier access from town (without driving): Desire for walkable/bikeable connection from Fort Macleod.

Activities & Special Features

- Dog access: Divided feedback—some want expanded off-leash access, others request stricter leash rules.
- Events & programming: Some would like to see special events, interactive signs, or family activities added.
- Horseback & biking trails: Requests for designated trails for equestrian or cycling use.
- Nature additions: Wildflowers, mountain biking courses, and native plantings suggested.
- Unique ideas: A few suggested things like a dock for floating access, perennials for planting, or even a small concession.


Park Facilities & Amenities

- Washrooms: Calls for better, cleaner, or additional facilities.
- Picnic areas & benches: Many want shaded, spaced-out tables and more resting areas
- Playground improvements: Several noted the current playground is small or outdated
- Waste management: More garbage cans and dog waste stations requested
- Better signage & maps: Wayfinding signs, trail maps, and clearer dog rules were suggested.
- Water access: Easier or safer ways to reach sandy or swimming areas were frequently mentioned.
- Security & monitoring: Some users reported safety concerns (wildlife, drug use, squatters) and asked for more oversight or patrols

Barriers to Use

- Lack of time: Multiple respondents simply cited their personal schedule as the main barrier.
- Safety concerns: Wildlife, traffic, and undesirable activity deter some from visiting.
- Vehicle traffic in the park: Concerns about drivers speeding or creating dust/conflict with walkers.

Q8: How important is improved accessibility at the River Valley Wilderness Park, such as a section of paved trail and parking lot?








Q9: Would you like to see the parking lot and one existing trail loop paved at the River Valley Wilderness Park?

MOST REQUESTED IMPROVEMENTS

Trail & Access Upgrades

- Safer way to walk or bike from town
 Add new loops and trail extensions
- Improve trail surfaces

More Amenities

- Garbage cans: more locations needed
- Improvement to Public washrooms
- Benches, picnic areas, and shelters


TOP CONCERNS

Protect the Park's Natural Character

- Ensuring the natural beauty of the park is preserved
- Concerns about paving increasing the traffic and the speed of bikes motorized vehicles on the pathways

Vehicle Misuse & Vandalism

- Off-roading, fence cutting, and damage
- Requests for barriers, cameras, and patrols





OTHER IDEAS

- Add beach or safe water access
- Preserve horse-friendly and wildlife areas
- Improve playground and add more family seating
- Better signage and clear maps
- No motorized traffic on trails
- Educational signage (plants, wildlife, Blackfoot language)

PAVING: MIXED FEEDBACK

PROS

Improved Accessibility

- Easier for wheelchairs, walkers, and strollers
- More seniors and families could enjoy the park

Smoother Surface

- Better for biking, rollerblading, and mobility
- Fewer bumps and ruts compared to gravel

More Use in All Seasons

 Safer and cleaner in wet or icy conditions

Positive Comparisons

 Other communities (like Lethbridge) have paved trails in nature areas without losing the natural feel

"Paving would help my dad walk the park again." "Great for kids learning to bike or seniors using walkers." "Paved paths can still be beautiful and respectful of nature."

CONS

Loss of Natural Character

- Many feel paving goes against the "wilderness" concept
- It could encourage more traffic and disturb wildlife

Environmental Impact

- Carbon footprint of asphalt
- Concerns about flooding and longterm maintenance

Increased Speed & Conflict

- E-bikes and scooters are already speeding on existing paved paths
- Safety concerns for walkers

Other Priorities

 Some prefer spending funds on more trails, better access or basic maitenance

"Keep it natural - we already have paved trails elsewhere." "Gravel is safer in winter and easier on joints." "Paving invites misuse. It's peaceful now let's keep it that way."
